

**PHYS 313: Quantum Mechanics I***Problem set # 5 (due October 25)***Mandatory problems** (each problem is 10 points).**Townsend, Ch. 4:** 4.4, 4.5, 4.11, 4.13 (*while this problem may look intimidating at first, it is actually very similar to ammonia maser problem we did in class*)**Townsend, Ch. 5:** 5.5, 5.6**Q1 Neutrino oscillations**

An elegant example of a quantum interference in a two-level system is neutrino oscillations (in reality, there are three flavors of neutrinos, but we'll limit ourselves with only two - electron neutrino  $\nu_e$  and muon neutrino  $\nu_\mu$ . However, such defined "flavor" eigenstates do not match "mass eigenstates"  $m_1$  and  $m_2$ .

Reminder: for a highly relativistic particles the total energy  $E_{1,2}$  depends on the rest mass as

$$E_{1,2} = \sqrt{p^2 c^2 + m_{1,2}^2 c^4} \approx pc \left( 1 + \frac{m_{1,2}^2 c^2}{2p^2} \right) \approx E_0 + \frac{m_{1,2}^2 c^4}{2E_0}, \text{ where } E_0 = pc.$$

The relations between the flavor eigenstates  $|\nu_e\rangle$  and  $|\nu_\mu\rangle$  and the mass eigenstates  $|\nu_{1,2}\rangle$  are as follows:

$$\begin{aligned} |\nu_e\rangle &= \cos\theta|\nu_1\rangle - \sin\theta|\nu_2\rangle \\ |\nu_\mu\rangle &= \sin\theta|\nu_1\rangle + \cos\theta|\nu_2\rangle \end{aligned}$$

Assuming that at  $t = 0$  the electron neutrino left the sun, show that the probability to detect it as an electron neutrino at a distance  $L = ct$  (where  $t$  is the travel time) is given by:

$$P(\nu_e \rightarrow \nu_e) = 1 - \sin^2 2\theta \sin^2 \left( \Delta m^2 c^4 \frac{L}{4E_0 \hbar c} \right),$$

where  $\Delta m^2 = m_1^2 - m_2^2$ .
